President's Message

Greetings everyone! This year the AZFA Board headed to West Yellowstone, Montana for our Midyear meeting April 24-26 hosted by the Grizzly and Wolf Discovery Center. All of the committees reported regarding ongoing initiatives and we were updated on the progress made in organizing this year's conference as well as 2017, and a possible future conference host and site.

I want to share the following with you because of the impact it has made at the El Paso Zoo. When I first started at the Zoo one of the biggest obstacles I faced was the inability to properly initiate, track, and archive work requests. The work request form that was being used was developed between our collections and facilities staff. The form basically outlined the work requested, the area, and originator. The main problem was that the work request lacked some key information, and would sometimes get misplaced, or duplicated by a different originator.

The task of finding a solution to this problem was assigned to some of our senior staff members, then reassigned, then put on hold, then assigned again. This went on for some time until we came across Facility Dude. Fa-

cility Dude is a web-based system that requires no software installation or hardware to maintain. It provides maintenance management applications that streamline maintenance operations by centralizing requests, automating workflow, and simplifying reporting.

We procured Maintenance Edge and Inventory Edge; these are two of the several products they offer. We have implemented Maintenance Edge which includes work request generation as well as status tracking and reporting of work orders. Planned Maintenance used to create maintenance schedules, automate work orders, assign, and manage recurring tasks is another feature. Then there is Work Order Wireless that enables maintenance teams to receive and manage work orders in the field through any mobile device. We are currently in the process of implementing Inventory Edge to aide our warehouse team.

It has been eight months since we implemented Maintenance Edge and we are approaching seven hundred work requests that are properly generated, trackable, and archived. It has simplified our jobs and has made a big difference in our day to day operations along with improving our relationship with fellow zoo staff.

Facility Dude joined AZFA as a vendor and participated at our conference in Chicago last year and will be joining us in Omaha this year October 16-20. They are also part of the AZA Smart Source purchasing resource program. There are a number of work order management systems out there but if you are in need of one I would recommend The Dude.

I look forward to seeing you all in Omaha for another great conference.

Clark Waldram Conservation Grant

On behalf of the Chicago Zoological Society, thank you to the AZFA for the Clark Waldram Conservation Grant for the Punta San Juan Portable Generator and Field Equipment project in Peru.

The Punta San Juan Program (PSJP) is a long term project of the Center for Environmental Sustainability of Cayetano Heredia University. The PSJP is a field research program based at the Punta San Juan (PSJ) guano reserve that conducts research, monitoring, and conservation of wildlife in situ.

We are happy to provide you with the following update on the work made possible by this grant. The funds were used to acquire a portable power generator and several small electric tools such as drills, grinders, and air compressors. This equipment will enhance the day-to-day operations of the program and allow staff, researchers, and volunteers to spend more time performing health assessments of the local ani-

mal populations, field research projects, and community engagement programs. At this date funds have been fully ex-

pended.

Electricity from the portable generator allows the field research station to be used at night so that permanent staff, volunteers, and researchers can work on their computers or deliver presentations within the Marine Protected Area. The generator also enables the power tools to be used and recharged.

The electric hand tools allow staff and volunteers to conduct basic upkeep and maintenance of the site infrastructure and enable them to repair research blinds and other equipment used in the field.

The power tools also allow the construction of field modules needed for fieldwork and wildlife monitoring, as shown below.





Tennessee Aquarium Receives Safety Award

The Tennessee Aquarium in Chattanooga, was recently presented with a safety award from the Accident Fund Insurance Company of America (AFICA). This award was presented to Rodney Fuller, the Aquarium's Facility and Safety Manager, for continuous safety improvement over the past three years. "Accident Fund Insurance Company of America has more than 45,000 insureds in 19 states," said Ryan Allen, AFICA's senior loss control consultant. "Each year only 10 distinguished insureds earn this award. The Tennessee Aquarium is the first Tennessee AFICA insured to receive an award."

Factors that led up to this safety award include:

- Use of the Lezage Online Training Resource. Under Fuller's direction, Aquarium staffers have been using this online training tool for several years. This resource is provided to the Aquarium for free by AFICA. The Tennessee Aquarium has performed more hours of Lazage Online Training than all of the Accident Fund's customers.
- Installation of slip resistant floor treatments. The Aquarium invested in slip resistant floor coverings, using epoxy with a sand topping in backup areas.
- Completion of loss control recommendations. In addition to the two key areas above, the Aquarium's Safety
 Committee continues with active safety inspections of all public and staff spaces in both Aquarium buildings,
 Aquarium ticketing center, Animal Care Facility, the IMAX 3D Theater, and the staff offices in the Coke Building.
 The Aquarium's Safety Committee is made up of team members from all departments.
- The Aquarium's experience modification rate (EMR) decreased over time. A 1.0 EMR is considered the industry standard. A low EMR score indicates a great safety record. According to Fuller, the Aquarium's EMR has fallen from .89 in 2010 to an impressive .67 in 2015, which is an extremely low rate. "This current rating means that our staff is thinking about safety on a daily basis, helping to reduce accidents and injuries," said Fuller. As a result of improved workplace safety, the Aquarium's insurance premiums were reduced by 33 percent.
