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# Past President's Message





### Proposed Bylaw Ammendments October 7, 2013

Language updates: Articles II, IV, and V

### ARTICLE II, Section 4

- a) Associate Members. These are individuals and/or students who are...
- b) Student Members. These are students who are enrolled in high school, college or graduate level courses at a minimum of 50% of a full academic schedule, provided the application of each student is certified be a principal, department head or any Professional member of the Corporation, and provided further that the student satisfy such other requirements as are proscribed by the Board of Directors.

### ARTICLE IV

### Section 3. Directors-at-Large

 One Director-at-Large shall be elected at each annual meeting of the Corporation from the group of past Board of Directors (Officers and Past — Directors-at-Large).

### Section 6. Notice of Special Meetings of the Board of Directors

- a) Oral, electronic, or written notice of the date, time and place of each...
- d) Written or electronic notice shall be made effective at the earliest of the...

### ARTICLE V, Section 4 The Corporation shall give oral, electronic, or written notice...

- a)1) ...if the notice is mailed by first class, or registered mail, or electronic; or, if notice is mailed by other than first class or registered mail or electronic, thirty (30) days to sixty (60) days before the meeting;
  - 4) E-mailed to the voting members' current recorded e-mail address.
- c) Written notice by the Corporation to a voting member is effective when emailed or mailed and properly addressed to the voting member's...

Section 5. Quorum. ... when there is a majority of the Professional members in person or by proxy or by absentee ballot...

Section 10. Voting by Proxy. A voting member of the Corporation may vote by proxy executed in writing or e-mail by the voting member or by his or her duly authorized attorney in fact. No proxy shall be valid after eleven (11) months from the date of its execution, unless otherwise provided in the proxy. An appointment of a proxy is revocable by the voting member.

### BALLOT October 7, 2013

### Officers' Roles and Responsibilities: Article III

Section 2. In general:

- f) Any officer may be removed, at any time by a majority vote of the <u>Board of Directors Professional members at the annual meeting</u>, with or without cause.
- g) All officers must read and sign the AZFA Code of Ethics for Board Members.

Section 5. The President-elect shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

g) Shall be responsible for the development and maintenance of goals for a long-range plan.

Section 7. The Secretary shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

c) Shall maintain serve as chair of the Historical Archives Committee.

### Committee Changes: Article VI

Section 1.Definitions. The President shall annually appoint such committees as are appropriate to conduct the business of the Corporation. Each Chairperson shall be a Professional member of the Corporation. Such committees shall have such responsibilities and powers as the Board of Directors shall specify. Members of other such committees may, but need not be members of the Board of Directors. A committee member appointed by the Board of Directors may be removed by the Board of Directors, with or without cause.

<u>Section-12.Historical and Archives Committee.</u> The Historical and Archives Committee shall consist of at least two (2) Professional members with one (1) of the members being the Corporation Secretary.

Section 13.LongRange Planning Committee. The Long Range Planning Committee shall consist of five (5) Professional members appointed by the President, one (1) member being the President-elect as Chairperson, one (1) member being a representative from the Membership Committee, one (1) member being a representative of the Conservation Committee. The Long Range Planning Committee shall develop and maintain objectives and goals for a five (5) year plan for the Corporation.

### Section 14. Other Committees.


Section 16. Accreditation Committee. The Accreditation Committee shall consist of a minimum of five (5) Professional members appointed by the incoming President. The President shall appoint the committee chair. The purpose of the committee is to establish basic standards and guidelines for facilities management programs and to set the facility condition standards for zoological and aquarium facilities.

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# The Right Light for the Job

Many animals (including humans) require light in the UVB spectrum (280-320 nm) to aid in the synthesis of a type of cholesterol in the skin into vitamin D3, which is then used to synthesize calcium in the diet into bone. Some animals, especially reptiles, can develop metabolic bone disease if they don't get enough of the right kind of light in their exhibits. The reptile husbandry market is saturated with literally hundreds of UVB bulbs, so which ones are the best ones to use? While



there is an application for just about every bulb out there, selecting the right bulb for the job is just as important as selecting the right tool for the job.

There are a number of factors to consider when selecting the appropriate UVB lamp for a reptile exhibit. Here are some tips to help you get started:

Research your reptiles – before you acquire an animal, do some research to find out where it comes from and what its needs are, including lighting, heating and humidity. If you are getting the animal from another Zoo or Aquarium, ask for some information about the exhibit that the animal was in so you can plan to match those conditions at your facility. As exhibits get deeper, you'll need higher wattage bulbs to penetrate to the bottom of the exhibit where the animals are.

Invest in a good UVB meter to make sure that your bulbs are placed at the right distance. A strong bulb placed too close can cause burns and eye problems. Solartech carries a wide selection of economically-priced light meters used across the reptile industry.

Make sure that your light's beam shines on a preferred basking spot to ensure good UVB exposure.

Whenever possible, create a heat and light gradient within your exhibits. Animals should be able to access both bright, hot areas and cool, shaded areas.

As the Environmental Quality Manager at the Brookfield Zoo, I've tested a number of bulbs from a number of different manufacturers. Some of the most promising bulbs that I had seen in a long time come from Mac Industries, aka Reptile UV. They offer a comprehensive line of lamps, and are a great source for information about exhibit lighting setup and UVB monitoring.

Some other manufacturers are Zoo Med, T-Rex Products, and Westron Lighting Corporation. All of these companies have staff available to help you select the right bulb for the type of animals that you'll be keeping in your exhibit.
