The Green Scene

2018 MASSRECYCLE Awards By John Piazza and Andrea Lewicki, Zoo New England

Zoo New England (ZNE) was recently nominated by Waste Management (WM) for the 2018 MASSRECY-CLE Awards Business Vote under the Institution/University category which is presented to an educational, healthcare, government, nonprofit, or other organization or facility that has developed and is operating an outstanding recycling and/or waste reduction program. Of the five nominees, which included names like Whole Foods and Gillette Stadium, ZNE placed second.

Nomination Summary

Zoo New England has maintained a meticulous materials management system from on-site food/yard/manure waste composting, single stream recycling and baling cardboard to the separation of redeemable bottles and cans, metals, wood/pallets, and e-waste. ZNE also has a Terracycle brigade and a "Free Bees" employee exchange/reuse program.

In the summer of 2017 ZNE conducted a comprehensive waste dive with WM's Total Recycle Program Manager. The outpouring of staff participation enabled ZNE to sort over 900 lbs. of trash and weigh seven categories of waste streams. The waste dive results showed less than 12% of the waste was comprised of recyclable material. Information gained from this exercise helped identify strategic priorities for making continuous improvements. ZNE worked with WM to improve waste handling strategies and practices. Several primary goals were set towards establishing these desired improvements:

- Establish improved identification and separation of recyclable waste material
- Reduce the amount of necessary truck trips for having ZNE waste removed from both zoo campuses (Franklin Park Zoo, Boston, MA & Stone Zoo, Stoneham, MA)

- Improve handling of green waste materials
- Improve regulatory compliances with waste materials being removed from ZNE properties.

Achievements

Recyclable materials:

- Held staff education sessions to improve participation and compliance with ZNE sustainability initiatives.
- Instituted dedicated recycling bins at every work station and work area throughout both campuses and increased the number of dual waste/recycling containers in public areas.
- Established separate recycling programs for card board and scrap metal waste which provided the dual benefits of creating revenue streams through reimbursements and also effectively reduced the volume of single stream waste per week.
- Created a mail monitoring system to identify opportunities to have staff names removed from mailings and catalogs. It was estimated that hundreds of pounds of paper waste was diverted yearly by eliminating these unwanted materials.
- Zoo map collection boxes were established at each entry/exit point of both zoos to allow guests the option for turning in used maps for paper recycling.
- Instituted WM LampTracker recycling program for proper disposal of used light bulbs at both campuses.
- Instituted WM BatteryTracker recycling program for proper disposal of used batteries at both campuses.
- ZNE's Green Team is currently looking into ways to capture stretch plastic and used textiles for bulk recycling, with several small satellite collection efforts taking place currently.

Green waste:

Consolidated green waste management strategy for handling horticulture cuttings, bedding and

manure waste generated at both campuses by using a single, local reclamator for receiving green waste for conversion into mulch and high grade compost.

• Created small scale in-house composting program at Franklin Park Zoo for creating a closed loop compost system. This system converts manure and food scrap waste into compost which is used to grow produce in ZNE's Organic Garden. This produce is incorporated into animal diets.

Outreach:

- ZNE's Webmaster created a sustainability page for helping communicate internal ZNE sustainability efforts to guests and Zoo members and to provide educational materials to this audience for additional opportunities for them to engage in green practices.
- ZNE Green Team created an internship program, with the first Green Intern graduating this past year after conducting an investigation into water usage at Franklin Park Zoo and identifying what improvements could be made through practices and equipment.
- Identified a postconsumer outlet for corrugated plastic which is part of the packaging material for shavings deliveries; a high volume material. ZNE paired with the University of New Hampshire's Institute on Disability's Assistive Technologies program which was converting this material into devices targeted to help disabled people better function with everyday tasks. Examples of this work were the production of iPad and laptop computer holders and even pizza holders. ZNE supplied this program with several deliveries of 4' x 4' sheets (estimated 300 - 400 lbs.). The program had previously been relying on sporadic infusions, mostly during election cycles, of used campaign signs. ZNE was also instrumental in writing a letter of endorsement for this partnership which helped secure a \$75,000 grant award.
- Created pilot partnerships with Social Catalyst Charitable Foundation (SCCF) and Relan to identify postconsumer opportunities for plastic bailing twine and promotional banners which make up sizable waste streams within yearly Zoo operations. Twine may be used in artisan fabrics and promotional banners may be used for hand bags and totes.
